Do I need vaccinations?

Yes, but just your normal travel ones. You will be in and out of the ocean, mixing with the local wildlife and trekking through some cool nature parks – so we highly suggest you contact the Australian Government Department of Health & Aged Care for up-to-date information on which vaccines are recommended.

Suitcase or backpack?

Ultimately, the choice is yours. You can bring whatever makes you feel comfortable. As we specialise in Boutique Tours, roller suitcases are manageable across all of our tours. However, due to luggage restrictions on some of our transport networks, there is a maximum weight of 20kgs.

Tech and charging

Generally, it's between 8.5hrs to 10 hrs different (ahead)from CET

What's the cost of a cuppa coffee

To start, the cost of dining, drinking or grabbing a cuppa coffee will change from town to town and between more local eateries and tourism hotspots – it's the same as most places around the world.

However, a general guide to budget on is:

Coffee - AUD\$ 2.50 - \$4 Breakfast - AUD\$8 - \$15 Beer - AUD\$5-8 for a pint

Money Honey - Credit Cards, Eftpost and Cash

Australia has a wide range of banks and ATMs available, with cash machines accessible 24/7. Before your trip, it's a good idea to check with your bank to confirm that your cards will work in Australia. Generally, ATMs accept cards linked to Visa, MasterCard, Maestro, Cirrus, or Plus networks. Most banks operate between 9 AM and 4 PM and offer foreign currency exchange as well as travellers cheque services at competitive rates. While major credit cards are widely accepted in shops, overseas EFTPOS cards won't work, so you'll need to withdraw cash from an ATM when necessary.
